Landscape Uses: Mix with other perennials, good to use around cactus, agaves, and succulents to soften the look, use with rocks for naturalistic landscapes.

Other Stuff:

- Known as the "workhorse of the desert" because it will grow under the most extreme conditions, including the summer heat of Phoenix.
- Tolerates poor and compacted soils.
- Rots easily with too much water.
- Blooms all year.
- A short-lived perennial in native environments, but can grow as an annual most anywhere else.
- Can go to 5000 ft.
- Generally won't tolerate below freezing temperatures.
- Best to start from seed in the fall, not good for transplanting.
