Other Stuff:

- May drop leaflets in response to cold or drought.
- Dehiscent pods with thickened margins, opening explosively from the tip to the base, ejecting the seeds several yards away.
- No watering needed when established, but it looks better with some water
- Best in rocky/gravelly soils.
- Little to no maintenance.
- · Beware of mealy bugs and mites.
- Attracts butterflies and hummingbirds, and quail eat its seeds.
