Vauquelinia californica (Arizona Rosewood) in Phoenix xeriscapes: Use Vauquelinia californica as an informal, privacy, or noise screen. Works well around a swimming pool, as an accent, or as contrast to greyer or greener foliage. Arizona Rosewood makes an excellent native alternative to oleander in Phoenix xeriscapes. Very little litter, no thorns.

Wildlife: Attracts bees, butterflies, and birds.

More about *Vauquelinia californica* (Arizona Rosewood):

- Arizona Rosewood gets its name from the reddish-brown color of the heartwood.
- Can grow to 20-30' and, with pruning, can be trained to a small tree.
- Vauquelinia californica requires very little, if any, pruning unless to control height or shape.
- Give Vauquelinia californica monthly deep watering in the summer to promote growth.
- Arizona Rosewood grows slowly until the roots take hold (about one year), then grows faster.
